How Dementía Taught Me to Communícate—A Personal Essay by Neíl R. Manowítz, PHD

My mother, Judith was diagnosed with vascular dementia in 2009. After a two year period of home care and a brief stay at an assisted

living facility, Judith was admitted to Inglemoor in May, 2011, where she resided until her death in June, 2018.

Living in nearby Morristown, I was able to visit Judith an average of four times a week, which works out to nearly 1500 visits during her stay at Inglemoor, where she received continuous excellent care. At the time of her admission virtually all of her higher cognitive abilities had significantly declined, including spoken language. Therefore it is fair to say that during most of my nearly 1500 visits nary a single spoken word was exchanged between us.

Despite this limitation I believe that we were able to communicate on a deeper level. We now know that despite loss of declarative

memory the long term memories and emotional life of the dementia patient are pre-

served well beyond the loss of the ability to speak. It was these shared emotional feelings and memories that I believe we were both able to tap into, and is the reason that I believe we both looked forward to my visits.

I would never be accused of being a great communicator, being more of the "strong silent type". However, my shared experiences with Ju-

dith during the past seven years helped me understand the importance of body language, a gentle touch, a warm smile, and a deep level of communication on an emotional level that greatly benefitted both of us.

It was an experience that will stay with me always. In many ways, at age 69 I had finally grown up.

Dr. Manowitz kindly submitted this article to us after his mother's death. He also lovingly donated the piano that resides in the dining room several years ago.
